As soon as Eta Chapter forwards their charter, the Board will prepare copies for those Chapters which have none. If your Chapter has misplaced their original, please advise us.


The Constitution would have been sent to you earlier, but change were necessary, due to Convention business, and these are under way.

ETA CHAPTER

Eta Chapter was most highly honored last Spring by being privileged to act as hosts for the Twenty-fourth Annual Convention of Gamma Delta Psi. While the preparations moved slowly at first, the work of the Active Committee, Brother D. Bullard, Chairman, and Brothers Brown and Bernhardt, was brought out at the business meetings and the entertainments for the delegates that followed every session.

We feel that it might be interesting to you to hear of the activities of some of the brothers of Eta whom you met at the Convention, during the summer following. Brother Dexter Bullard, Secretary of the Convention, served as athletic advisor at a large Y. M. C. A. camp in Connecticut. Brother Frank Hadnot added further to his many laurels by capturing the A. A. U. 440-yard Metropolitan Swimming Championship, besides winning several cups in the same sport. Brother Harrison Bullard, delegate, spent his time in preparing for college, as did also Brothers Thralls and White.

Beginning with the first meeting in the fall, Eta buckled down to real work, and as a result has just passed through one of its most successful terms at Erasmus Hall. Gamma was well represented on the varsity football team, Brother Gordon Simmons holding down the position of right half-halfback and Brother Peter Tiorano, the difficult position of left end. Brothers Astrom and Brown also were members of the squad. These boys were a big factor in the team, winning every game but one, and thereby securing gold footballs and gold E's for themselves.

The sport in which Gamma had its greatest number of varsity men was the popular game of soccer, which rates high in New York sports. Five of the brothers displayed such skill at the English game to secure regular berths and varsity letters. Besides which two brothers, namely, Brother D. Bullard, at center half, and Brother John Manning, at goal, were selected by the "*Eagle*," as the premier players at their positions in the city.

Now comes that popular, invigorating sport of swimming. Here, also, Gamma was "in the swim," having four brothers on the varsity. These boys, Brothers Simmons, Donigan, Riess and Brooks have been of invaluable aid to a team which promises to be a championship one.

And track, the first competitive sport of man, does not find Gamma wanting, for Brother D. Bullard is lead-off man for the championship relay team, and Brother Simmons promises to excell in the "300."

Although not playing on last year's team, Brothers Ostrom, Degan and Bullard will probably represent Erasmus on the ice hockey team, which sport will start in the near future.

Then with spring will come lacrosse and baseball. Brother Simmons, veteran pitcher, will be in the pink of condition to represent Erasmus on the mound, with Brother Tiorano at second base, while Brother Bullard, veteran defense player on the championship lacrosse team with Brothers Ostrom and Degan, from the second team last year, will strive for honors at that sport.

Eta has initiated five men since September, and has a bright future, with these men rapidly learning and appreciating the glories and traditions of our own Gamma Delta Psi.

The Catalogue Committee, Brother D. Bullard, Chairman, Brothers Wilkinson and Hambel, has been handicapped somewhat by the various Chapters' tardiness in returning needed information, but as the material is gradually coming in, the committee is bending every effort to put that important issue over for the next Convention.

ALPHA IOTA

On the evening of November 22, the day of the Syracuse-Colgate football classic, Alpha Iota of Gamma Delta Psi held an invitation subscription dance in the magnificent grand ballroom of the newly constructed Hotel Syracuse. "Pep" Barnard's Orchestra, a ten-piece aggregation, popular in Central New York, was engaged for the event, and its efforts were classed by those present on as high a scale as those of the famous Vincent Lopez Orchestra, playing in the main dining room of the hotel on the same evening.

The floor was filled to capacity by enthusiastic Syracuse supporters, out to celebrate the 7 to 3 victory over Colgate, within half an hour after the doors were thrown open. After the grand march and Alma Mater by the A-I Chapter men, the ballroom rang with yells of the various fraternities and sororities in attendance. To cap this climax, a large crowd of Colgate students gathered in the center of the floor and made the great hall fairly tremble as they roared out a mighty Colgate yell followed by three "Gamma Delta Psi's!"

After the last patrons had taken their leave, the receipts were counted and it was found that the Chapter had netted over four hundred dollars, with all expenses paid!

Publicity was secured in the four local papers by the writer, and neat handbills, printed in Old English type, were placed in several thousand cars parked near the stadium during the game.

Several hot debates have taken place among brothers of Alpha Iota Chapter as to who are now national jeweler and national outfitter. Is it not fitting that the brothers who have been elected to these honorable positions send some notification to each Chapter? Alpha Iota has had delegates at every National Convention, but so much transpires at these meetings that is difficult to retain an account of each detail.

The Chapter usually has its picture taken sometime during the school year and it will probably do so this year, but it is still a little too early in the year to have this done.
