Editorial

Our 50th celebration of the founding of GAMMA DELTA PSI — what a wonderful thing to realize and what an opportunity to show the skeptics of student organizations of this character that there is a real place for the high school secret society in the progressive and wholesome up-bringing of the high school youth of yesterday and today.

GAMMA still stands, as it always will, for everything that is best in the young men of high school age.

Our record of continuous service as a national organization is not equalled by any other scholastic national fraternity in this country and our steady growth since the war is a clear indication that our fraternity is built on fundamentals that have both stability and progressiveness.

Our National Board of Control, under the leadership of interested alumni, has shown foresight and actual business acumen in the regulation and performance of the affairs of the fraternity, and our financial standing at the present time is in the strongest position it has ever been.

The individual chapters, themselves, have each one been through difficult and disheartening periods since the war, and yet today, of the total membership of seventeen chapters, there are only a very few who have not progressed substantially since 1919.

The alumni of the various chapters, and this refers to those of now inactive chapters as well as those that are active, are interested (a statement which may cause many to smile and question, but a statement which can be substantiated with facts). There are some five or six alumni organizations now functioning and two of the strongest ones are composed of alumni of chapters who have not had active chapters in their local high schools for ten years and more. The National Secretary only this month attended a banquet of an alumni organization and pretty nearly 50% of the entire original chapter membership was present, many coming from considerable distances to meet again their chums and comrades of their early youth. Statements, that can also be substantiated, were made without solicitation that an affair of

this nature aroused a greater thrill than any other gatherings that had been attended since schooldays and we do not exclude those men who were fortunate to attend college and join national societies of collegiate standing.

You ask them why this is so and they can not definitely explain it but the spirit, the enthusiasm, for GAMMA is still in their breasts and nothing can

ever take away from them this feeling, started, fostered and definitely instilled in them when they were members of GAMMA DELTA PSI.

Can I say more to impress upon you — active brothers, alumni brothers, fathers, mothers, teachers of the schools, and even the legislators of our laws — the advantages that can be and have been derived from organizations such as our GAMMA DELTA PSI?

Most unusual events* marked the passing of Brother Maher and the Alpha Chapter in order to in some way express its deep regret passed a series of resolutions—a clipping of which, obtained from the high school paper—is printed below.

At a meeting held the 28th day of December, 1928 by Alpha Chapter of Gamma Delta Psi Fraternity, to take action upon the untimely death of our brother and schoolmate, Lincoln A. Maher.

Whereas: it has pleased the Almighty Father to remove from our midst our dear brother, Lincoln A. Maher,

Whereas: our brother had been a conscientious and faithful worker in our fraternity, be it

Resolved: that we hereby mourn for him and are consoled by the fact that our brother has entered the Kingdom of Heaven, be it

Resolved: that we extend our sympathy and condolences to his family with the prayer that they may find strength to sustain their great loss, and be it furthermore

Resolved: that a copy of these resolutions be sent to the family of the deceased, another copy placed upon the records of Gamma Delta Psi Fraternity, a third to be placed in the GARNET AND SILVER, the publication of this fraternity, and a fourth to be inscribed in the class book and *Sentinel*.

The only information we have regarding Brother Sherk is that he died of heart trouble while at his home, 367 West Delevan Avenue, Buffalo, N. Y.

Kappa Alumni Banquet

NAYASSET CLUB, SPRINGFIELD
February 22, 1929

Who would believe it—after ten years the Kappa Alumni of the now inactive Kappa Chapter of Springfield, Mass., put on one of the most enthusiastic and interesting banquets that it has ever been my pleasure to attend.

Eighty-three brothers of Kappa Chapters, with all the enthusiasm and spirit (and I use this word advisedly) that even while actives could they have mustered sat down to a “red hot time” at the Nayasset Club in Springfield, February 22nd, 1929, at 6 p. m. The number actually represented there was really more than the above figure mentioned, as letters and telegrams from almost all parts of the world poured in on the Committee during the days of preparation even up to the very minutes of the assembly itself, and each letter and telegram expressed the deepest regret for being unable to attend.

That nearly 50% of the total membership of the chapter was present in person speaks volumes for the interest of the members and the work of the Committee in charge. I am reproducing below a few parts taken verbatim from the original announcements sent out to all the brothers:
