EDITORIALS

On Thursday, April 24th, the 1930 National Convention of Gamma Delta Psi will assemble at the Hotel Taft in New Haven, Conn., under the auspices of Alpha Chapter. Last year at Newark, N. J., we celebrated our 50th anniversary and fourteen of our seventeen active chapters were present. We sincerely hope that those chapters (Sigma of Buffalo, N. Y., Chi of Eau Claire, Wisconsin, and Alpha Eta of Niagara Falls, N. Y.) who were unable to send delegates last year will be represented this year. Suffice it to say we expect the other chapters to continue the good work by having their delegates attend for still another year.

Only those delegates who attend can realize the wonderful spirit that goes hand in hand with our conventions and they in turn can and do impart this feeling of brotherhood to the other members of their chapters who were not the fortunate ones to be on deck. Surprisingly so, perhaps, but a great many familiar faces return year after year to these gatherings. Alpha Chapter has one of the most loyal and strong bodies of alumni we

have and the convention committee is looking for a large turn out. But let's have plenty of representation for other chapters as well.

We are sincerely sorry to note the resignations of our National Officers and emphatically state that credit for the remarkable progress and healthy condition of our fraternity today can be laid directly to the work of the officers of the last ten years. Outstanding, of course, is our one and only "Junior" Stewart of Nu Chapter, the guiding hand in our progress since 1919 and our National President for the last seven years. From a condition of chaos and debt "Junior" has brought the fraternity to a position that commands attention from all national scholastic fraternities. Our financial condition last year, with a bank balance of approximately \$1000 and all bills paid shows remarkable management and a true example of efficient and economical handling of the fraternity funds. Any tribute which we offer here is infinitesimal compared to the service he has given the fraternity for eleven years. His name will go down in our records as the outstanding figure of all times.

His assistants in the roles of vice-president and secretary changing three or four times during his regime were imbued with his spirit and a wonderful spirit of co-operation resulted. In the years to come let us remember this brother and his assistants as true examples of Gamma men.

Chapter Correspondence

EDITOR'S NOTE: *The response to the National Secretary's letter has been good so that we have some real interesting letters to print from quite a few of the chapters.*

Alpha

The convention will open with a meeting at 2.00 P. M., Thursday, April 24. All the meetings will be held at the Taft Hotel. The delegates, also, will stay at the Taft. Thursday evening there will be a dance at the Taft Ballroom. Friday morning at 10.30 there will be a meeting followed by another meeting in the afternoon. Friday evening there will be a banquet. Saturday morning the convention will be closed by another meeting.

The delegates will, of course, be admitted free to the dance and banquet. The delegates also will receive their board and room at the expense of our chapter. The visiting brothers will be admitted at the dance for \$1.75—that is, a dollar less than the regular price. I would like very much to have the names of the delegates in as soon as possible so if you would mention this in the GARNET AND SILVER I would appreciate it greatly.

We now have twelve active members in our chapter. Each is taking a very active part in school athletics. John Mack was a member of the football team, Captain of the hockey team, and is a member of the baseball team. John Moore was a member of the hockey team and of the baseball team. George Demetrio was a member of the football squad, manager of the basketball team, and member of baseball team. Bert Skipp is a member of football, track and baseball teams. I am a member of the swimming and water polo teams. Eugene Kiley, Carl Van de Bogart

and I are members of the business board of the "Gleam," a literary publication at school. We also have an office in the interfraternity council at school. Burke, our candidate, just broke the state interscholastic backstroke swimming record. Carl Van de Bogart is the president of the school circle, an honorary organization. I am a member of the school orchestra. You see we partake in quite a few school activities although there aren't many active members.

Our chapter ran two successful dances this year and we intend to have a "private" a week from Saturday. The convention dance, of course, will be the largest of the year.

We have had two members of the Lambda chapter attending our meetings lately. These are students at Yale.

I wish, if possible, you would urge the other chapters to answer the letters I wrote asking for information regarding the brothers coming from their chapter. We could make more definite arrangements when we know how many brothers are coming and when they will arrive. We also would like to know the names of the delegates.

Delta

We started out this year with only nine in the circle, certainly not a very auspicious beginning. But a fine group of new brothers has been added and we now number seventeen, not including two pledges which we now have. Brother Birge Thompson has made a very successful President for both terms, carrying on the general business and the meetings in a very commendable fashion, so well, in fact, that he was easily elected Delegate to the National Convention.

Boyd Pantlind, another veteran of the circle, has made a very successful Vice-President and discharged his fraternity duties painstakingly. Laurence Smith has made a good treasurer, note the comfortable balance in the Treasury. Brother Joe Griswold the first semester and Brother Bob Alexander the second, have held the office of Secretary.

So far, Delta has thrown three dances, one of which was given on the spring house party. This house party was the most successful of the season, according to everyone. The fall house party was handicapped by weather that was a bit chilly. One of the brothers gave a closed party a short time ago, a very enjoyable affair. Besides this, numerous rushing parties have come along here and there. Early in the season, we gave a rummage sale that turned out well; we are planning another for this week-end. Inter-fraternity basketball proved great sport this winter; we lost the championship finally, after a most auspicious start, but pulled in somewhere around second place. Inter-fraternity indoor will soon commence.

Among the more serious branches of Delta's activities are the correction and completion of the chapter's catalogue; the collection and deposit of Delta's documents in a safety deposit vault; the completion of the chapter history; and the collection of the chapter by-laws.

The meetings have proved very interesting this season. Brother President Thompson conducts very satisfactorily. Many excellent debates have taken place, and several clever literary programs have been offered.

Another phase of Delta's activity is the active interest of inactive members. The "Alumni" are particularly necessary to the chapter because of the state laws, but really, beside that,

they add ever so much to the meetings, and support fraternity activities. A basketball game which we had with them illustrates the general spirit.

Delta is also well represented in school affairs. Brother Edward Rood is Editor of the school paper, a position which I fall heir to. (The paper was originally started by Gamma Delta Psi, so this makes our appointments all the more fitting.) Brother Joe Griswold will be Business Manager of the paper next year; Brother George Clay is the Circulation Manager this year. Brother Griswold is also a regular on the basketball team; I played on the second team. One of our pledges is also a regular on the first basketball team and Number 1 man on the tennis team. Brother Griswold and I both think we can make the tennis team, too. Brother Laurence Smith is President of the school's chapter of the National Honor Society, of which Brother Rood is a member. Brothers Pantlind and Alexander received football letters; Brothers Thompson and Smith belong to the school varsity club, the "C" Club; I think Brother Thompson is some officer in it. This rather boring list is as complete a list of the brothers' activities as I can recall at the moment.

Zeta

I received your encouraging letter about a month ago and I'm just finding time to sit down and write a letter of "Thanks". Let me tell you it certainly does pep up the chapter to know that the National Board is behind us and pushing hard. We were a little discouraged at the beginning of the year but I assure you, you have been making up for lost time.

I received the GARNET AND SILVERS about two weeks ago. Everyone in the chapter read their copy from cover to cover and we must compliment Nu chapter on the edition.

We only have one objection to offer —there was too much convention and not enough chapter activity, although I guess Nu can't be blamed for not printing information they don't have. I received your letter asking for information for the GARNET AND SILVER, so here goes:—

At present we have thirteen active members, two having been taken in at our last meeting. The members of the active chapter are: Alton Rabbitt (Pres.), Elliott Bowles (Vice Pres.), Philip Haywood (Rec. Sec.), Thomas Webb (Treas.), Edwin Weedon (Corr. Sec.), Larry Grogan, Harry King, Robert Moore, Barry Hopper, Edward Cook, Jack Lynham, Edward Farrell, Thomas Foley, George Russell, and William Blanchard.

The chapter has been getting along pretty well. We have given four dances — three closed and one subscription. All the closed dances were howling successes both socially and financially, but the subscription dance should have been more of a financial success. Judging from the size of the crowd present, we should have made two hundred dollars instead of fifty. However, our overhead ate up most of the money we took in—no wonder having a ten piece hundred and fifty dollar orchestra and a hundred dollar dance hall. Nevertheless, we made money on all of our closed dances and, what was most important of all, we all had great times at our closed dances, not to forget the scrip dance.

All of Zeta's members have been quite active throughout the fall and winter. Alton Rabbitt was a mainstay on Western High School's champion basketball team and is also playing on the golf team, Elliott Bowles is a member of Western High School's track team, Philip Haywood, awarded

varsity letter in football, member of "W" Club, member of tennis team and honor student, Thomas Webb played a guard on Western's football team and he is playing No. 1 position on the golf team, Edwin Weedon got his varsity letters in football and basketball at St. Albans Prep School and so far he's playing regular second baseman on the baseball team, Larry Grogan is working but he may well be called a mainstay of the chapter with his helping ways and sound advice, Harry King is a junior in Georgetown University besides being the president of class, Robert Moore is attending George Washington University and he's an associate editor on the University's Publication, Barry Hopper got his football and basketball letters at Landon Prep school and he's got a good chance of getting his baseball letter also, Edward Cook got his letter in football, he is playing on Western High School's golf team, he is a member of the Dramatics and "W" Clubs, Jack Lynham is a star on Western High School's champion tennis team and he's a member of the "W" Club, Edward Farrell is putting all his time on his books and the opposite sex, Thomas Foley got his varsity letters in football and basketball at Donaldson Prep School and he's a likely baseball candidate, George Russell was a finalist in the Oratorical Contest at Devitt Prep School, William Blanchard is assistant manager of football and manager of tennis at Western High School.

The meetings so far have been attended by from three to twelve alumni. This is not up to last year's standard but most of the blame must be laid on the active members for we have not sent out meeting cards for every meeting. Many of our alumni are working out of town or are working on Saturdays.

An interesting thing happened about a week ago. One of our active brothers was playing golf when a middle-aged man walked up to him and, on seeing his pin, asked him if he were a member of Gamma Delta Psi. The brother replied to the affirmative and the middle-aged man introduced himself as Mr. Phelps. (I think that was his name.) The latter said he was an old Gamma Delta and that he was in Zeta chapter in 1911. Of course the two of them had quite a talk. Mr. Phelps said that he often played golf with quite a few of the old alumni. Mr. Phelps suggested that Zeta chapter stage a good old reunion. We talked this over at the last meeting and we are thinking of staging a big alumni banquet in the near future.

Last meeting we were honored by the presence of a brother from Psi chapter at Kiski School in Saltsburg, Pa. The brother Mike Kinora (I guess that's the way you spell it), is now attending Georgetown University in this city.

Money, or should I say the lack of money, isn't going to be the factor to stop some of our brothers from attending the convention this year. Edward Cook and Thomas Webb are working hard at the job of landscape gardening and they plan to stage a treasury in the near future in order to raise enough money to attend the convention. Noble Cook and Alton Rabbitt are staging a great "Social Club" dance in order to raise sufficient funds to attend the convention—Here's hoping they go over!

Eta

Eta chapter has eleven active members at present and we intend soon reaching Eta's old standard.

As I suppose you know Eta chapter is spread over three different schools. The majority of members

however are in Erasmus Hall. One member is a prominent track star and others are entered in golf and tennis tournaments.

Eta chapter is well supported by their alumni, who have formed themselves into a club called the Gamma Delta Psi Club. Last Friday night we held our first meeting in our chapter rooms which has been rented for us by the Gamma Delta Psi Club. We have our alumni to thank for a good many things which have bettered our chapter.

RESOLUTIONS FOR THE 1930 NATIONAL CONVENTION

The following resolutions are those which have been received by us from the various chapters. These must be discussed by your chapter before your delegates leave for New Haven, Conn., even if it means calling a special meeting. Give your delegate as much latitude as possible to determine whether he should vote yes or no on these measures should information come forth at the meetings which might mean a change in the original instructions your chapter gives its delegate. These were forwarded to each chapter on April 15th.

From Alpha

A comment that the regulation regarding the use of a Post Office Box should be rigidly adhered to for convenience in maintaining contact year after year by keeping the same P. O. Box number.

From Delta

RESOLVED: That if National Board dues are not paid within two months of the date on which the bill is received by the active chapter a fine of ten percent of these dues be imposed upon the delinquent chapter.

RESOLVED: That the first issue of the year of the GARNET AND SILVER shall have a list of all the active members of the fraternity with their schools, chapter and place of residence, and that there shall be a list of all new members in each succeeding issue.

From Zeta

RESOLVED: That the fraternity should be and must be extended.

A motion that Brother Robert Moore of Zeta Chapter be permitted to speak for forty-five minutes on the "GARNET AND SILVER."

From Eta

RESOLVED: That the election of officers be changed from bi-monthly to twice a year, that is the first week in February and the first school week in September.

RESOLVED: That an official fraternity key be adopted.

*From Nu**

RESOLVED: That following the death of any brother the chapter to which he belongs shall, at the next regular meeting of that chapter, stand in one minute of silent prayer.

*EDITOR'S NOTE: *This resolution was submitted after those of April 14 were sent out and is therefore not included in that list.*

Instructions to Convention Delegates

- (1) Each delegate must be prepared and instructed by his chapter, to vote YES or NO on all resolutions which have been submitted to you.
- (2) Each delegate must be supplied with his chapter ritual and constitution for reference at meetings.
- (3) Each delegate must keep an accurate account of his travelling expenses from the moment he leaves his home until he reaches New Haven, Conn.
- (4) Each delegate should be informed by his chapter corresponding secretary, the number of letters his secretary has received and sent out during the past year.
- (5) If your chapter owes money to the National Treasury, bring check covering as much as possible, to the Convention.
- (6) Instruct your delegate to be prompt in arriving at New Haven, Conn., and attend all regular meetings and committee meetings.
- (7) If you have any definite complaints, bring them to the Convention.
