In speaking of convention, we might add that the conclave slated for Syracuse next June will be all that Zeta offered—and that is plenty. Zeta set a new high in convention entertainment and the Alpha Iota brothers have advised us that they, in being the first to carry on the precedent, have a wonderful time in store for all of us.

We want to make the official organ of our fraternity better in each succeeding issue. To go back to the stiff cover, a picture on every page and hundreds of other factors that tend to dress up an issue is our aim. It can only be done with your support. It's the age old question of everyone doing his part. Sometimes we wish that we might find some new cry but it's an old weakness without a new remedy. What can we do but ask?

The reason for the lateness of this issue is the tardiness of the reports from the chapters. The present staff started writing in November and didn't stop trying to have a 100%

LOOKING AHEAD

With the events of the past few years fresh in my memory, I am optimistic about the future. Without reservation I say that Gamma Delta Psi has pulled herself out of the depths of despondency and is now riding on the crest of a wave toward the sandy shores of Prosperity. Such a statement indeed sounds optimistic when one considers that it comes from a National President who has been waddling around in the mire with Gamma Delta Psi for the past three years.

When I took the oath of Office at the Detroit Convention and again at the Washington Convention, I made promises to those there assembled that by the time the next convention rolled around, Gamma Delta Psi would be a stronger fraternity. These promises have been faithfully fulfilled. We have made advances month by month. It has taken time—it has been a long, hard and bitter struggle, but we are winning. Prior to the Detroit Con-

vention we had nothing—not a single record. Since that time we have had issues of the Garnet and Silver, financial statements at Convention covering the period of laxity, a new Chapter, two revived chapters, increased correspondence, a more united effort toward success and a better financial standing. Is that advancement? Isn't that reason enough to make one optimistic?

Brothers, I have seen the day when it was impossible to get an answer from a chapter, when it was impossible for a chapter to get an answer from the National Board, when the National Board was a silent factor, when the chapters were silent factors, when the National Board was one man and when the chapters had no correspondence among themselves. That day is not far in the past, but I am happy to say it is gone forever. The National Board is now composed of ten brothers, seven of whom are serving you right now as District Deputies in various localities. No letter from any chapter goes unanswered. The correspondence between chapters is greatly improved, a comprehensive bulletin has been issued by the present National Board. Is that advancement? Isn't that reason enough to make one optimistic?

The wheels of progress are in motion and away we go to another Convention—the third successive Convention in as many years. Now what do we look for at the next convention? I cannot answer for other members of the fraternity but I can answer for myself. As National President, I anticipate the return to the sane principles laid down by our Constitution. I would like to see the re-establishment of the article making it mandatory that the Garnet and Silver be published by the home chapter of the National President. I would like to see the former method of chapter taxation restored. I would like to see that article making a unanimous vote necessary to amend the Constitution re-established.

Brothers, I would not desire the passage of such resolutions unless I was fully aware of their necessity for the preservation of Gamma Delta Psi. You have had faith in me during the past three years—you have trusted and honored me. I have not failed

you and I know that you will not fail Gamma Delta Psi. I know that you will not cast aside these suggestions and that you will benefit by the experience I have had in office. You must realize that I am for Gamma Delta Psi always and I am better equipped by experience to judge the needs of Gamma Delta Psi as a whole than any other individual or group of individuals at the present time.

I would like to see a Constitutional Advisory Committee set up as a permanent fixture in Gamma Delta Psi. This Committee could be appointed by the National President from among the alumni of his own chapter (preferably lawyers) and serve for one year. It would be their duty to act upon all resolutions passed at National Conventions. Their decision would be final as to the legality of such resolutions. Their term of office would not cease at the will of the National President but rather at the opening of the Convention next following that convention at which the appointing President is elected. I feel that such a resolution would be a safeguard against any radical tendencies which might arise in Convention. They would act as a sort of Supreme Court.

The time will not be long in passing now before we meet in Syracuse for another Convention. At this Convention another National President will take the oath of office. I trust that he will not be forced to serve under the strain of many Constitutional changes. Such changes work hardships on the National Board, on the National Treasury and on the backbone of the entire fraternity. I hope that all brothers who read these statements will heed them and profit by my experience as National President during the hardest, shakiest years of our existence. Whatever the conditions, whatever the change, I hope that the incoming National President will receive the same cooperation that I received. I trust that he will be conservative in financial matters and that under his guidance Gamma Delta Psi will reach the goal of Fraternal Utopia—a 100 per cent chapter roll, a full treasury, and a stronger Gamma Delta Psi for you and your sons—for me and mine.


Delta is planning her annual father and son banquet which has always been a great success. Delta chapter enthusiastically joins the cry—"On to Syracuse in 1936".


