





"BLACKOUT" OR RADIANCE*

Are we going to have a "blackout" of the National Non-Academic Fraternities? Here is a question to be carefully considered by those groups which have, for so long, played an active and permanent part in the lives of countless thousands of American citizens of today.

In retrospect, we close our eyes and think back a few years to the time when there were strong, well-organized fraternities, with conscientious National Officers at the helm, directing the welfare of each organization. Much good was being done, as all chapters were well-organized and conducted successful meetings, and in addition, were serving humanitarian needs. Help was being extended to the needy and a high morale was in evidence. Fraternities were giving off strong rays of radiance.

We open our eyes to see the conditions as they exist today, and find an entirely different picture. Poor chapter attendance, and small evidence of the true spirit of the organization. There is very little interest from either the chapter or National Officer. Conventions are poorly managed with very few delegates in attendance. Gambling, prevalent in practically every Fraternity, leads to the loss of chapters, and to the complete "blackout" of the entire Fraternity.

Only at the insistence of several National Officials have we presented this treatise so bluntly, with no punches pulled. It is an attempt to paint the picture as it exists.

SUGGESTIONS

We have no patented remedy. We do believe that the solution lies entirely with the members of the Fraternities. We can only recommend and suggest the following aids, which have been of some assistance in the past:

- (1) Prohibit all forms of gambling.
- (2) Closer examination of all pledges.
- (3) Regular attendance at chapter meetings.
- (4) A more serious attitude toward your obligations, and more respect for your national officers.
- (5) Adoption of a definite help-program.
- (6) Sending chapter delegates to National Convention, and a definite plan of raising the necessary expense money.
- (7) Election of qualified chapter and national officers.
- (8) Less fault-finding, and more co-operation.
- (9) Adoption of inter-chapter and national competitions.
- (10) Loyalty to your own organization.

Very few American boys evade a direct challenge. Here is one that applies to your own Fraternity. Will there be a "blackout," or will there be radiance?

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



BULLETIN No. 4 March, 1940

The National Board has forwarded all material required under the Constitution or by order of the 1939 Convention, namely:

New revised Constitution, Rituals. Chapter Treasurer's books.

GARNET AND SILVER—Three issues.

Quarterly Invoices and Quarterly Reports.

Treasurer's Report.

Under a new section of the Constitution, the National Treasurer shall now report the condition of the Treasury between Conventions, and with all large bills paid except the third issue of the GARNET AND SILVER and the stenographic work from June 30, 1939 to date, there is approximately \$600.00 on hand.

By checking your 1939 Convention minutes, you will note we had \$785.00 in the treasury. It therefore becomes evident that the Chapters must balance their accounts if the Fraternity is to prosper and expand its activities.

I believe the Board stated that ample opportunity would be given the delinquent chapters to meet their obligations. This has been done. We herewith list each chapter and the amount due as of March 20:

(In the case of Chapters so starred *, we have had to approximate charges inasmuch as quarterly reports have not been sent in.)

We regret to inform the Fraternity that Alpha Zeta is one of the largest Chapters, yet they have failed to remit one cent on their indebtedness since the new Board Officers took over January 1, 1939.

You will also note there is outstanding about \$300.00 among the Chapters. This is not a very healthy condition and the National Board must therefore demand the immediate liquidation of your Chapter bills.

ESSAY CONTEST—Where are all the entries we expected? Gamma was founded on the basis of "literary and musical enjoyment" for its members. There's a swell prize waiting for one of you to grab off at the Convention. We must have at least one entry from each Chapter, so get busy. The judges want something to do!

GARNET AND SILVER—The National Board thinks that Nu Chapter has done a fine job but why not give Brother George Smith, Jr., 322 Tappan St., Brookline, Mass., it's Editor, a little more material help. He is only an active trying to serve you as any loyal member wishes to do.

TO THE CHAPTER TREASURERS—I wish to offer my services in helping to straighten any bothersome problem in setting up and maintaining your accounts. If you start the system and keep it active each week, it is a simple and sure way of knowing the worth of your Chapter and the accurate amounts owed by each active or alumnus member.

OFFICIAL BADGES—According to the returns received from L. G. Balfour, our official jewelers, new members as well as old actives are not wearing the official pin prescribed in the Constitution. This is a violation of a member's oath. I am sure you are proud of the privilege accorded Gamma members; therefore there is no valid reason to be without a Fraternity pin. The substitution of a sister pin is not allowed.

1940 CONCLAVE—Convention time is approaching. You should be thinking about your delegate and alternate, also resolutions to be discussed at our meetings.

WHERE ARE WE GOING TO MEET???

That's the annual question. I hope National Vice-President, Brother Sliker,

COMING CONVENTION NOTES

The 1940 Convention, we hope, will be sponsored by Alpha Eta Chapter, will be Gamma Delta Psi's Thirty-Sixth Annual Convention.

Start planning for the Convention in your Chapter now. We can assure most of you that come this year that the expense will not run over \$25.00. So — if you brothers will start putting away those nickles, dimes, and quarters now you won't have any trouble when the time comes around.

This is a big year in Gamma this year, as we are celebrating sixty years of Fraternal Brotherhood.

If the Convention is held in Upper New York State it affords us the advantage of a very central location — so start planning on it now — it is none too early.

Notes of the 1939 Convention in Detroit:

Most common sayings and who said them: John "Bur-le-cue" Watson, Alpha Kappa, "What show haven't we seen boys?" — "Bill" McGrath, Nu, "Any more Stroh's left in that barrel?" — "Tom" Bell, Zeta, "Draw more, please." —

Those we'd like to see at the coming convention: Dave McMahan, Delta; Penberthy Brothers and Dave Searles, Iota; Tom Saylor, Tom Bell, and Max Brandstetter, Zeta; "The Great Watson," Alpha Kappa; Costello-Fassoulis & Co., Alpha Iota; all of Alpha Eta following Walt Mimnaugh; and as many other brothers as can possibly get there.

DON'T FORGET THE FOLLOWING:

You must have all resolutions in the hands of the National Board at least five

weeks prior to the Convention. Any resolutions received after that will not be allowed to be used.

Your delegate and alternate delegate must be elected at least one month prior to the Convention and their names submitted to the National Board at least one month prior.

Your candidate for District Deputy must be nominated by your Chapter at least one month prior to the Convention and submitted to the National Board. This should contain the candidate's name, address, and qualifications for the office.

There has been, in the past, some talk as to the expenses of the delegate and alternate delegate. The Constitution states that the delegate's expenses to, at, and from the Convention are to be paid by his Chapter. The alternate delegate pays his own way to, at, and from the Convention unless the Chapter wishes to pay part or all of it and this is not usually done unless the Chapter is overloaded with money.

All brothers must have pins to be admitted to the business meetings of the Convention, so, any brother who is planning to go and has not as yet purchased a pin, do so at once. Have your treasurer send for it immediately.

There must be a quorum present to start the Convention, therefore, at least seven Chapters must be present, so, get your Chapter in shape for the coming Convention now. Don't wait until the last minute or you'll find yourself out in the cold.

Also, get started on any resolutions that your Chapter may want to send in. Be ready with your complete list when called for by the National Board.

This notice that follows is for the sponsor. The Sponsor of the Convention is required by the Constitution to take care of all the delegates when they arrive in the Convention city. That is, the host brothers are to put up at least one man each in their homes for the duration of the Convention. This is to cut down hotel bills of the delegates so as to save the Chapters as much money as possible.

All Chapters should at this time get started on any names of deceased brothers in their Chapters that are to be written into Nirvana Chapter at the coming Convention.

Until the next issue, THE CONVENTION ISSUE, good luck to all Chapters, and may we see them all represented at the coming Convention.

In Memoriam

E. E. BELDING PASSES AWAY

DEAN OF GREENFIELD NEWSPAPERMEN

(Special Dispatch to *The Herald*)

GREENFIELD, March 24 — Everett Elijah Belding, 61, dean of newspapermen in this city and a former member of the State Legislature, died in Franklin County Hospital after a week's illness.

A native of Springfield, Mr. Belding was educated in the Springfield schools and was graduated from Phillips Andover Academy in 1899. He entered business with McIntosh & Co., wholesale shoe dealers in Springfield, and became treasurer. When the firm was changed to Everett E. Belding Company, headed by his father, he was made treasurer and general manager.

He retired from business in 1912 and was elected to the Legislature from the fifth Hampton district for two years and served as House chairman on harbors and public lands. For three years he was a member of the Springfield city government.

Mr. Belding began his newspaper career with the *Springfield Republican* and after four years became a member of the editorial staff of the *Greenfield Recorder*, serving for 17 years. He was a life member of the Springfield lodge of Masons.

He leaves his widow and a daughter. Services will be held Tuesday at 1.00 P.M. Burial will be in Oak Grove cemetery, Springfield.

Former National Board President, Brother Everett Elijah Belding, Theta Chapter, occupied the highest and most cherished position in our Fraternity during the year 1906-1907.

A WARNING AND AN APPEAL*

EVERETT E. BELDING,

President of the National Board

In these days when the anti-fraternity agitation is being so generally discussed throughout the country, two things are primarily necessary for the life and advancement of each and every fraternity, no matter how strong a position it may

hold in its community. These necessities are the proper actions of the actives and the loyal interest of the alumni.

In the first place, the actions of the actives should be beyond public criticism, and the officers of each chapter should so control their members that at no time could they overstep the bounds. This is necessary not from the fact that the active members do those things that are at all different from those of other boys of that age, but because they are at that age when it is considered the privilege of everyone, whether interested or not, to criticize them "for their own good," as they say, and which generally does the boy more harm than good. These conditions have been so for ages back and the larger the number of the perpetrators of these pranks, the more the criticism: thus the thoughtless action of one member reflects on his whole chapter, his fraternity, and all other like organizations.

The papers have recently published an account of an initiation of three members of a high school in a Massachusetts city, into one of the so-called "Prep. Frats," where the candidates were branded on the cheeks with nitric acid. These three young men are disfigured for life and a just ground for indignation aroused, and all from thoughtless action and unrestricted foolishness. Now we cannot believe that this organization which the papers mention could be other than an inferior body that had dubbed itself a "Frat," and whose existence and tolerance should be regretted by every fraternity of good standing, but this fact does not aid but only makes it more necessary that we strive harder than ever to put our fraternity on a higher level than it is even today. Our fraternity has no place for the thoughtless, heedless fellow who thinks after he acts, and should such a one ever secure membership in our fraternity, let that chapter of which he is a member take care that he is controlled. Let each active feel that he is personally responsible that no criticism should be made of our fraternity and see that the actions of his respective chapter are such as would be at all times beyond criticism and out of public notice.

My word to the actives of each chapter is, to be strong and manly at all times, thinking of others and doing for others, and being honorable and just to everyone at all times. By so doing you will do your share in raising our fraternity to a pinnacle of success.

To the alumni, it can simply be asked, "What has the fraternity done for you?" and should there be any who honestly feel

that it has done nothing, let him read this article no longer for he has wasted his opportunities. To the alumnus, though, who feels, as do most of us, that the fraternity has aided and helped him in his life and success, to him can be said, "What return are you making your fraternity?"

Awake! laggard brother! look around you and see the changes that have come about in the past few years. Are you not proud of our fraternity? There are brothers as old and as busy as you that are putting in their time and efforts even now to the advancement of the society, and why should you not do your share?

The man who works the hardest for the fraternity today, you will find is a leader in the community where he resides and is receiving honors and the confidence of all with whom he comes in contact. This being so, the work surely cannot belittle anyone, and as we need your help and cooperation, does it not behoove you to answer this appeal? The alumni should help their actives and see that they spend their efforts in the best and proper channels and aid them with suggestions and most of all, by your interest show them that the fraternity is not a plaything but a practical schooling for future business and social life and that they should strive at all times to be men of the first stamp.

Don't forget your National Board, which is working for the interests of the alumni and actives alike and is giving time and thought for the benefit of all. We need encouragement, we need suggestions, we need your support and assistance, and as we can't come to all personally and solicit it, we ask you to volunteer. Let every alumnus, by a new interest in the affairs of his chapter, help us build our organization into a tower of strength and power.

INTER-CHAPTER RELATIONS

Fraternalism, according to Webster, is the theory of Brotherhood. Following this up, a major premise could be drawn to the effect that Brotherhood is the brotherly relationship of all brothers of a Fraternity.

Now let us suppose that Gamma Delta Psi is the only Fraternity in existence, the aforesaid paragraph would then apply solely to us. Making a reality out of a supposition, we now definitely know that it does. Knowing this, just how much does it apply to us? In the various Chapters of Gamma Delta Psi, it no doubt fits per-

fectly, but among these Chapters themselves, how strong is it?

There is nothing to my mind more important than close association of our far flung Chapters. The work carried on by our corresponding secretaries necessarily plays an important part in striving for closer inter-chapter relation, but this is not enough. Correspondence should be encouraged between the brothers of the various Chapters, so that they might come to know each other before personal contact can be established. It should be the duty of every brother to correspond with some one brother or more in every Chapter of Gamma Delta Psi.

Then, where transportation facilities are reasonable, the brothers of close Chapters should travel back and forth, attending each other's social functions, Fraternity affairs, such as rushes, initiations, etc., and even personal parties. One outstanding example of this is the close associations of Alpha Iota and Alpha Eta Chapters, which has been reported on in this issue of the GARNET AND SILVER.

Such extremely important work as this should be taken up by other Chapters in order to bind even more closely the Great Brotherhood Under the Crescent of Gamma Delta Psi.

ALPHA OMICRON CHAPTER SUSPENDED

It was with profound regret that it became necessary to indefinitely suspend the Charter of this Chapter.

By unanimous vote of the Officers of the National Board of Control on March 22, 1940, after every possible means was used to secure the co-operation of Alpha Omicron Chapter, due notice in writing was forwarded to two members of the suspended Chapter by registered mail.

The officers of your Fraternity believe that one year is ample time to allow a Chapter to answer it's appeal.

Therefore it is decreed that no Chapter or individual member is permitted to, in any way, contact this Chapter or its members until the suspension has been lifted.

If within thirty days from date of document, there is no action taken by Alpha Omicron to relieve their position, the

Fraternity may then permanently remove them from the roster of Chapters. This the Board respectfully hopes can be avoided.

In the meantime, all material for Alpha Omicron has been withdrawn and the official jeweler has been instructed to refuse all orders from the suspended Chapter and its members.

Hockey — Alpha's ice hockey team concluded a very successful season with a record of two triumphs and one defeat. Brother Smith was rewarded for his brilliant playing during the year by being selected as center for the all-star team.

Swimming — Brother Charles Flannagan, a junior at N.H.H.S., and recently a member of Alpha is one of the outstanding schoolboy swimmers in the state. He swims the 220-yd. freestyle and the 100-yd. backstroke for the varsity, and has turned in many fast times. Charlie swam the 220-yd. freestyle and also on the 200-yd. relay team in the Connecticut State Inter-scholastic Championships at the beautiful

Yale pool. He placed second in the state championship 220-yd. freestyle and swam on the victorious 200-yd. Hillhouse relay team.

Dances — Alpha held its Sixtieth Anniversary Dance last January and it was the most brilliant event of the Fraternity social calendar. Many alumni away at school came back for this event and were very pleased with the work of the active brothers.

Brother Jimmie Watson, brother of John Watson, a plumbing engineer.




