





## EDITORIALS

### PRESIDENT SEYMOUR SPEAKS

A week ago I had the privilege of participating in a banquet which celebrated the sixtieth anniversary of the organization of the Alpha Chapter. It was an impressive occasion, and I wish that there might have been present delegates from all the Chapters of Gamma Delta Psi. One after the other brothers expressed their gratitude for what the Fraternity had meant to them, a few in speeches, most of them in casual conversation. One had the impression of a great force that united these men, some of them out of high school for two generations, others still active members. As they talked about old experiences in Gamma and conjured up reminiscences, it was clear what a great power for good Gamma had exercised in their lives.

In these days of international disaster and domestic confusion the world is crying for men of brains to help us from our dilemma, but still more for men of character. We cannot escape except by recapture of moral standards, disregard of which forms the chief factor in our existing misfortunes and the dangers that threaten. Character comes from schooling, but it cannot be created consciously by the schoolmaster. It is the by-product of school and it depends largely upon the

atmosphere of the school in which boys of different types can rub against each other and learn by actual contact the lessons of social experience. Gamma Delta Psi in each of its Chapters has created such an atmosphere. It has contributed powerfully in the unconscious development of character in thousands of young men. We who have enjoyed the benefits it conferred, acknowledge gratefully our undying appreciation.

### HAVE SECRET SOCIETIES ANY PLACE IN A PUBLIC HIGH SCHOOL?

One of the fundamental objectives of the free public high school is to train young people how to live in a democracy. In such a school one finds intermingling the rich and the poor, the well dressed and the poorly dressed, the native born and the foreign born, the good and the vulgar, as well as those with differing religious beliefs. Here is collected daily young America, the bone and sinew of our nation — the young people who are to grow up and represent this country in every line of activity. Regardless, then, of any differences of birth or situation each student learns to understand and value the other, realizing that each is equally important to the welfare of the other. Each has rights the others must respect and each must understand that in their united interests lies their future prosperity, and an enlightened citizenry. This being the case, there must be no class distinctions and no cliques — yet from its very nature the secret society creates both.

How then can a secret society justify its existence in a public high school? Conduct your society along the simplest lines, avoiding all extravagances and show. Members should mingle freely with others not in their society, remembering that classmates are dependent upon your companionship as part of their education. Avoid acting as a society, always be individuals in public with rare exceptions. In school elections work and vote for the strongest candidates. Never allow, under greatest penalty, anything to be said in your meetings that is low or vulgar, especially regarding girls. Hold them in the highest esteem, for they are the very life of our nation — the makers of homes. Be true to your school and its interests. On these lines I would back any secret society in a public high school.





## 60th Birthday Party Enjoyed By Alpha Chapter of Gamma Delta Psi Fraternity

### GAMMA DELTA PSI AFFAIR IN UNION LEAGUE DOES HONOR TO SEYMOUR

Lauded as a fine character-building organization, Alpha Chapter of Gamma Delta Psi Fraternity last night celebrated the 60th Anniversary of its founding and honored Charles Seymour, president of Yale University, at a dinner in the Union League, attended by nearly 150 persons.

#### HISTORY BY JUDGE GILSON

A brief history of the Fraternity was given by Judge John L. Gilson, who presided as toastmaster for the twenty-seventh time, and introduced as first speaker, Arthur Jackson, the last surviving member of the group that founded the organization. Mr. Jackson summarized the early activities and stated that at that time he "never dreamed that he would be able to see the 60th anniversary of the Society."

"To me this is a wonderful meeting," was the expression used by Philip Pond, who recalled early days at Hillhouse and as a member of the Fraternity, and stated "it is a fine thing to get together like this, to encourage the feeling of exhilaration that comes to us through our association with Gamma, an association we are all proud of. We also rejoice that we, at this time, can pay our respects to President Seymour."

Commenting on the Society, Charles L. Kirschner, advisory principal of Hillhouse High School, said, "it is an honor to which we aspire, but few are picked," quoting from the early bids given to candidates. He attributed "any of my value to society" to aid provided by early contacts with Gamma men.

#### FAVORS SECRET SOCIETIES

Regarding an attempt some time ago to ban secret societies in high schools, Mr. Kirschner stated he had always regarded them favorably, and that at the present time in Hillhouse there are more than 30 sororities and fraternities.

Frank E. Bollman, recorder of the Fraternity, lauded the younger generation, and stated "it is the youngsters that are keeping us going. They know more than we give them credit for."

The Alpha Chapter was reported by Edward Stewart, National President of the Society, as one of the finest groups of young men in the organization. John J. O'Neil, President of the Chapter at Hill-

house at the present time, spoke briefly, presenting the Class of 1940 as a standout in the organization.

Congratulating himself on being a member of the Fraternity for 41 years, President Seymour stated he was "happy that you have associated the 60th Anniversary with my name."

Citing the values received in the Society, he asserted, despite the fact that "the future is so black we can't build castles, it is delightful to build castles of the past, of which Gamma is one of the foundations."

"Life in Gamma, and Hillhouse prepares one for a life of politics. It is what we need today, because the breakdown of moral standards has caused the world holocaust of today."

Letters were read by Carleton H. Stevens from J. E. McIntyre, and Judge Gilson from Palmer York and Stuart Hemingway. Others introduced by Judge Gilson were Ellis B. Baker, James E. Wheeler, Frederick D. Grave and Stanley Daggett.


