HAIL TO THE CHIEF

Dear Brethern:

It is only fitting that I should take time out now to express to all the Brothers of Gamma Delta Psi Fraternity, my profound appreciation of the trust you placed in me at the 1941 convention in Grand Rapids, where you so unanimously elected me to the highest office obtainable in our Great Fraternity.

As your National President, I have had but one thought in mind since returning from Grand Rapids, that is to make Gamma Delta Psi Fraternity stronger, larger, richer, more powerful and better recognized throughout these United States and Canada.

Last September, I personally went to Boston, Massachusetts, at which time the National Board property was turned over to me in person by Brother George D. Smith, Jr., National Vice-President. Also at that

time we discussed plans for the forth coming year.

It has been generally agreed that the most important objective this year, is the re-building of Gamma Delta Psi. In the past we have been too willing to let matters stand as they were. Consequently we are now finding ourselves in a very spent and weakened condition.

This year, I have tried to impress upon you, the importance of bringing in new chapters, and reviving old ones. This is going to be the year that counts. If at our next annual convention, we find that we have not doubled, yes, I said, doubled, our Active Chapter Roster, then we have failed miserably. This is undoubtedly a big order, and one which will require the combined efforts of every available Gamma man throughout our whole Fraternity.

Let Us Stop and Think!

In 1939, Brother Edward Jessup Stewart, Nu 79, past National President, graciously consented to re-organize the National Board of Control. (In passing, it should again be noted that we will always be indebted to Brother Stewart for this action.) At the 1939 Convention in Detroit, we found that we had about \$800.00 in the National Treasury and somewhere between twelve and fourteen active chapters.

At the 1940 Convention in New Haven, we found that we had a little under \$600.00 in the National Treasury and eleven to twelve Active Chapters. Quite a loss for one year! ! ! !

At the 1941 Convention in Grand Rapids, we found that we had TEN Active Chapters and some appreciable loss in the National Treasury. ANOTHER TWO CHAPTERS GONE! ! ! !

What Are We Going To Do?

This year your National Board

GARNET & SILVER

fully realizes the conditions we are in and is bending every effort to remedy them.

First of all: Special emphasis has been placed on the National Board Delegates. We have asked that each National Board Delegate acquire himself a committee and work in conjunction with the District Deputy of his District.

Secondly: All District Deputies have been appointed and given special instructions.

Thirdly: For economic reasons, two new Districts have been created. District Six was spoken about in Bulletin No. 1 and comprises Greater New York City. District Seven comprises Delta Chapter, formerly of District Five, and four dormant Chapters, Chi Chapter in Eau Clair, Wisc., Rho Chapter in Milwaukee, Tau Chapter in Chicago, and Pi Chapter in St. Louis.

This information is all relative to our gigantic expansion program. We must have the immediate co-operation of all District Deputies, National Board Delegates and New Chapter Committees if we are to achieve our ultimate goal next June.

What Has Already Been Accomplished

Brother Herbert S. Ham, District Deputy One, has reported that already plans have been laid for a proposed new Chapter in Newton, Massachusetts. Brother Edward J. Miller, District Deputy of District Four is investigating Oswego, New York for a new Chapter. Brother Cleveland Thurber, Iota, District Deputy of District Five, has practically completed plans for a new chapter in Cranbrook School, Bloomfield Hills, Michigan. Brother Dave McMahon, District Deputy of District Seven, and Brother Webb, both of Delta, are considering plans for a new chapter in Battle Creek, Michigan, and Brother McMahon has already started operations on Chi Chapter in Eau Clair. Perhaps in the next issue of the Garnet and

Silver we can announce that two or three more districts have come through with new chapter prospects.

Financial Support

In order that we may adequately carry out all our proposed plans, financial support is necessary. Every Chapter should endeavor to pay up their National Board bill in full immediately. In another section of this issue there is a complete listing of Active Chapters and amounts owed by each. Come on Brothers, pay up and expand.

Proposed Subscription Fund

By the time this issue reaches you, each active chapter will probably have the printed material in its hands pertinent to the NEW CHAPTERS FUND. Be sure that you follow up each proposed subscriber. It is your action that will count. If the National Board did not feel that this plan was necessary it would never have put it into operation. It is for your benefit and should deserve your every attention.

Garnet and Silver







Fraternalities are by no means modern. They have been in existence for centuries and centuries. Maybe these societies were not identified by Greek letters, but in some way or another men have always banded together. You might say they more fully developed from friendly societies, which were most prevalent in the 18th century. These societies, the result of

medieval guilds, were usually introduced to help industrious classes in sickness, infirmity, old age and other exigencies. In other words they were organizations formed in order that individuals might help one another.

Naturally the English settlement in this country resulted in English customs, and hence the fraternity comes into the picture again. Various fraternal societies sprang up in new America and grew to a great height, especially during the period from the Revolutionary to the Civil War. In 1776 the first of the Greek letter fraternities was founded in Williamsburg, Virginia, at the College of William and Mary. This was the father of countless college fraternities which are still active in our universities. High schools followed suit and inaugurated fraternities for the interest and development of youth. Among the greatest of these is Gamma Delta Psi, which was founded in 1879 by Alpha Chapter at Hillhouse High School in New Haven, Connecticut.

For sixty-two years we have been achieving, and now in the most critical era of the fraternity we must not fail. We must go on achieving and winning; keeping the fair name of Gamma Delta Psi where our founders willed it to be put.




