# Editorial

Nobody will be interested enough to do a little work to alter the antiquated rules or challenge the cliquish establishment.

You think I'm wrong? Maybe I'm overly harsh, you say defensively. Be at the convention and see if I'm not right. Sit in your chair and watch it all happening - from the outside looking in. Again.



All debts have been paid and we anticipate further income, from dues and our summer variety show, which will be added to our present bank balance which is already considerable. This Garnet and Silver which you are now reading has been published for the fraternity completely free of cost for the first time in our history. All funds garnered from the sale of this book will also be added to the bank balance, thus strengthening our financial position even more.

I have been greatly assisted in my task this year by two gentlemen who joined the Board of Control following the resignations of several key members earlier in the year. My sincere thanks are extended to Dan Gardiner, who ably operated as Northern Vice-President for several months, and Eric Maginnis who has served admirably as Secretary. Once again the Board of Trustees deserves our commendation for their continued effort. In particular Brother Marskell, the chairman, has laboured diligently for the betterment of Gamma Delta Psi; however, Brothers Jamieson, Flemming, and Stoodley, the creator of our new pledge manual, have also made notable contributions.

I wish to conclude by expressing my desire to further serve the fraternity as a Board of Trustee member, if elected at the approaching convention, after handing over the President's mantle to a younger more enthusiastic individual.





Basically I have been working with my District Deputies, attending numerous chapter meetings, collecting names of all the brothers in southern chapters, and asking for help.




## TREASURER'S NOTE




# Beta Iota

Beta Iota started off this fraternal year on the wrong foot by not representing themselves at convention. In September we had eleven actives and a treasury of approximately seventy dollars. We proposed a pledge period that started at the end of September. It ended the next day. To say the least, we were very disappointed but we kept our heads up. In late October we set up a table at a nearby shopping plaza and collected thirty-three dollars at this Charity Blitz. Then, in November, the great depression hit Beta Iota. Jobs and other interest had cut us down to five brothers who were able to attend the meetings. November and December were long and cold. We were unable to raise any money and we did not have enough confidence to begin a pledge term. Sunday after Sunday we met in an informal atmosphere and discussed how to get back on our feet. We finally decided to strengthen ourselves internally and give the public a better look at us. By the end of February we had little money and were more than one hundred dollars in debt.

Fortunately we did have seven willing and confident brothers. We prepared a pledge period of fantastic proportion. Only students in grades nine to eleven were eligible and the prospect only needed two votes to receive an invitation to join. While we were preparing this pledge period a certain district deputy started to visit us on a regular basis. At this time I would like to thank John Mitchell on behalf of the chapter for the guidance he gave us in our time of need. In the last weeks of March we handed out almost forty invitations to a preliminary meeting. Half these letters were answered and out of those who attended this first meeting, ten lasted until their induction on March 22nd, 1970.

Since that date we have flourished. We obtained a local rink for Friday nights and from this we raised a little profit and a lot of spirit. # What is our bag

"Fraternities may be on the way out". These challenging words were voiced by several of the leading fraternalists at the recent Inter Fraternity Congress Seminar. I, for one, believe the words are true and I think if we look at the evidence we will see the unmistakable signs of failure within our own organization. Chapters from all over the U.S. and Canada are having increasing trouble to get good prospective members. They say - "There is too much competition from other fraternities" - "Nobody wants to go through a pledging period" "Brotherhood doesn't mean anything anymore". Of more immediate concern there is increasing difficulty in filling the International Board Offices with active bodies who will accept the responsibilities to assure continuation of our fraternity.

WHY? Well first let us consider the reasons for joining a fraternity:-

(1) **PRESTIGE AND BELONGING** - We have always got a lot of mileage out of the fact that there is snob appeal in being a fraternity member and wearing the pin and jacket. This is a lousy way to run a railroad, but we have rationalized saying "even if the motives of the pledge are not the best, when we get him in he will realize that there are more important things"

(2) **FOR BROTHERHOOD** - Define that if you can in such a way that you can use it to convince some to join Gamma Delta Psi

(3) **EXCHANGE OF IDEAS**- with men of similar age but different backgrounds

(4) **SOCIAL ENJOYMENT** - attend exclusive parties (more snob appeal)

(5) **ACQUISITION OF SOCIAL GRACES** - presumably by association with older brothers.

The question is - are these of any appeal to to-day's young people?

The young men of to-day are sophisticated at the age of thirteen or fourteen - prestige means less and less - everyone is "doing their own thing". Why join a fraternity? **WHAT CAN YOU DO IN A FRATERNITY THAT YOU CAN'T DO OUTSIDE.** . Very Little.

Then we continue to put our prospective members through an ordeal of degrading pledgship which at best has very little concrete effect on assuring our new members will be active and which probably is one more reason for young men deciding "this is not for me".

O.K. - So what - Do we fold up? This is our challenge! ! The time has come for fraternities to consider the modernization of themselves with a view to leading the young people. It is revealing of our state when you consider that two years ago we were concerned with teenage drinking when liquor was on the way out and drugs on the way in. The fraternities must concern themselves with to-day's world - it must offer education and leadership to youth on drugs, birth control, sex education, politics, world situations - we must take a stand and we must speak out.

If you feel strongly about Gamma Delta Psi and have some ideas about where we are going and what we should do, your ideas are wanted.

What's our bag? **TO LEAD** and we've got to start **NOW**.




