

President's Message

Greetings, y'all ..... Brothers, I had originally intended to utilize this column to formally notify my fellow I.B.C. officers and Board of Trustee members of my official resignation from active duty as International President, which was to take affect immediately. However, with further contemplation, I strongly hesitate to offer such a malignant statement as it is premature, unjustified and unnecessary.

In retrospect of recent fraternal events and related activities of which I will elaborate on in detail later, I remain in a precarious situation. As I sit at my desk writing this report, it has become increasingly difficult to verbalize and record all of my inner thoughts I have concerning Gamma Delta Psi in its past, present, and future state. I guess, the most logical path is to relate to y'all my past attitudes and experiences with fraternity that I've possessed these last few years.

On May 28th, 1978, I faithfully pledged an oath to Gamma Delta Psi Fraternity International, its Constitution and its Brothers. Also on that same day, I made a pact with myself never to renege on my devotion, trust, loyalty, and faith in our great fraternity. Today, I feel as though all of those qualities have been tested and tried relentlessly.

From my earliest days as a young, renegade, and naive Brother of Gamma Alpha chapter, I firmly believed that all Brothers upheld, respected, and cherished these fine priniples of fraternity. Not unlike any other Brother of Gamma Delta Psi, I was typically inducted into fraternity in the midst of my sophomore year of high school. At the time of my ritual, the chapter was greatly in debt to the I.B.C. for non-payment of our annual dues, and thus, we were placed under temporary suspension with the distinct possibility of having our charter lifted by the Board. Ironically, Gamma Alpha was full of cocky, energetic and optimistic Brothers.

We were all pretty tight in those days, and we didn't seem to mind showing off our spirit, friendship and Brotherhood to other non-fraternal friends at school. Fraternity life back then was uncomplicated, casual, and quite simply a lot of fun. Although, we tended at times to lean towards the socializing aspect of fraternalism, within the chapter existed an unbreakable cohesion and everlasting bond. I also recall a strict adherence to our Constitution and following parliamentary procedure to the book.

In short time, Gamma Alpha was struck by the infamous travel bug and we surely redefined the term, 'road trip', making a barrage of timely ventures down south and beyond. During that time period, I took advantage of the many offerings that the chapter had at its disposal: the popularity and recognition at school; the sense of belonging to a group and being accepted by your peers; as well as capitalizing on the extra-curricular activities of fraternity - chasing skirts, drinking beer, and playing sports.

As a unit, the chapter attended regional rallies, conventions, periodically wrote letters, and strived to better an ill-deserved reputation within the community, school, and home. It was from these early conventions and other events such as Grand Brother stags, dances, and so forth that, I met many Brothers. I fondly recollect having built great rapport with several older Brothers, whom are now more commonly and warmly referred to as "Ol' Farts". Well, I've been very fortunate to have had so many excellent exchanges with these farts, and they've always been a constant source of inspiration to me. Unknowingly to many of the small corp of alumni, I have adopted several as key role models in life.

One item of which I have continually been in awe over, is the high degree of comradery and Brotherhood which seems to be an inherent part of assimilating one's self into the ranks of alumni. It is derived from this bonding of Brotherhood where the term, 'Good Brother', can trace its origins. I have always believed that the highest compliment a Brother could receive was to simply be called or referred to as a 'Good Brother'. A 'Good Brother' possesses all of those qualities I mentioned previously: dedicated, trustworthy, honest, and faithful.

In the last five years, I've attended virtually every fraternity event and function available to me, save for the countless chapter social gatherings of which I have reluctantly grown out of. I guess, its been an unwritten obligation of mine to attend these functions, seeing as how I've been an I.B.C. officer during that time span. However, I believe its been mostly because I have wanted to and my heart desired to be there.

At Convention '81 held in Richmond, Virginia, I was elected to the position of Secretary-Treasurer on the I.B.C.. That first year on the Board really awakened me to the true spirit and meaning of fraternity, and I took every opportunity to expand my knowledge about Gamma Delta Psi. I discovered that, by corresponding frequently and making literally hundreds of phone calls was a sure mode of enhancing the communication lines for our organization.

With an awful lot of coersive encouragement by the likes of Brother Bruce Johnstone (Trustee), the following year (Convention '82 - St. Catharines, Ontario) I decided to run for the I.B.C. Presidency at the ripe old age of nineteen. The year of 1982-83 was definitely one of the most demanding of my life thus far, as I entered my second year of college and took on the unenviable task of the President of the I.B.C. The Board that I had inherited was equally as young, inexperienced, and brash as I. Many of y'all may recall that year of continuous controversy and struggle between members of the Board, resulting in three resignations of prominent officers. The rest, as they say too often is history.

Now, after nearly four complete years as President, I feel as though the position has matured and aged me significantly. I also feel privileged to have served in such a capacity, and I would like to believe that I have relentlessly given 'my all' to this unique organization and asked little in return. Along with the particularly great moments I've enjoyed and shared with so many good Brothers, I can also count far too many hardships. I can reassure y'all that, I have spent many nights awake in bed or at my desk, full of aggravation and frustration over problems I had little control over.

Indeed, these times have been the very best of my life, and to briefly recollect them on this paper feels remarkably wonderful. When the time arrives to permanently vacate my place on the Board, I would like to leave with a deep sense of accomplishment, and honestly take the utmost pride in the work that I have done, both as an individual and more importantly, as a part of the I.B.C. I know what contributions I have made to the fraternity and to the I.B.C. in recent years, and I don't mind saying that every effort I made was on behalf of the betterment of Gamma Delta Psi and not for any selfish reasons. In all modesty, and with due respect to my fellow I.B.C. officers of past and present, I know the reasons for the resurrection of a once-dormant monthly newsletter. I have tried in the past to install an innovative approach to the production of the Grip. At times, I may have gone somewhat wayward, but only to bring about an arousal of interest and enthusiasm by our readers.

The Garnet & Silver was published last year, not because someone requested it, but simply for the reason that the I.B.C. thought it would be great to bring back such an important part of our tradition. I don't want to believe that my hand-writing of over 500 letters the last years, in addition to numerous editions of the Grip, the Garnet & Silver, and travelling three or four times a year to Virginia was done in vain. Maybe, it's just that I don't know what positive affects these things have done. I always believed that the domino effect would influence the fraternity's correspondence, whereas, if only one Brother wrote than, surely the rest would follow suit. Apparently, that has not been the case.

Brothers, I am not seeking neither glory nor sympathy for my past efforts, as anyone close to me knows that is not my angle. Nor, will I accept all of the credit for previous I.B.C. achievements. However, there is something that I dearly resent, and that is being reminded of Gamma Delta Psi is presently in a so-called, 'Kuch Era'. I think that term is somewhat scary, and denotes a status extraordinarily above what I represent. Recently, I have also heard echoes of our fraternity is in need of a savoir. Nonsense. The fraternity can not afford to lay its hopes, faith and aspirations in the palm of a single Brother, however convenient it would be to have another young Guthrie, Fermoile, Jameson, or Stockdale at the helm. What Gamma Delta Psi needs is not a miracle, but just a few 'Good Brothers' or possibly an army of 'em.

For too many years, I have actively attended conventions and the only things you could depend on besides a young Brother losing his virginity and tossing his carrots all in the course of one evening, was to see the same faces and hear the same words, i.e. expansion, funds, pledges, etc. Nowadays, conventions are a lot like giant air balloons, 'there's so much hot air around and so very little forward motion'. It's time that all of Gamma Delta Psi comes to grips with the way our fraternity now operates and moreso, what we represent as an organization. We are, and have and always will be a strong unified body in spirit and pride, but is that sufficient to survive? I hope so and have great belief that we can succeed once again. However, we must realize that sadly, our fraternity is today, only a mere shadow of a dominant, vibrant, and effervescent predecessor of the 1960's. Today, we're about one-fifth the size we were some twenty years ago, and certainly that much weaker financially, which brings up my next issue.

In May of 1985, the I.B.C. Treasury had been nearly depleted of all funds, as a direct result of the Board's preoccupation with publishing the Garnet & Silver and producing the Grip on a near-monthly basis. Additional capital expenditures included postage, stationary, phone, and money spent on staging rallies and Convention '85. Undoubtedly, these costly factors crippled our meak I.B.C. Budget for the year, forcing the Board to operate at a huge deficit as we have done so often in the past. In essence, we simply ran out of money, and unlike national governing bodies, we obviously do not have a license to print money or collect taxes.

Thus, the I.B.C. officers had to pay for items such as those listed above, out of our pockets. From the summer of 1985 up until the present, I have personally invested a rather substantial amount of money into the fraternity's account without any guarantee of being reimbursed. I have been well aware of that fact and have always been willing to accept it. I can again, reassure every Brother that, without the inducement of these funds, the fraternity would be a more fragile and humble organization. As of December 28th, 1985, I had forwarded exactly \$1289.36 (Canadian) from my personal savings account into settling major expenses and investments of the I.B.C. The vast majority of this money was loaned to the Board for last Convention (\$185.00) and the post-Christmas Alumni Reunion & Dance '85 (\$700.00). To-date, I have collected approximately \$700.00 back with about \$600.00 outstanding. I do not have any gripes about losing money, however substantial it may seem to some. The money is not that important to me, and as I mentioned previously, I knew full well of the risks involved.

More importantly in my view, the I.B.C. in general and yours truly in particular, have far greater and more significant financial woes. In September of 1985, I negotiated a loan with the Board of Trustees of which constitutionally, I am a voting member as President of the I.B.C. This loan was made payable via the ever-popular Trust Fund to the sum of \$1700.00 (Canadian), and to be paid in full (without interest) on January 1, 1986. The loan was used accordingly to pay off the I.B.C.'s debt of \$1694.00 to Af-Trin Graphics Limited, printers of the Garnet & Silver '85 project.

At an informal Trustee gathering last autumn, I conversed to great lengths with Trustee Brothers Bruce Johnstone, Gerry Thompson and Scott Crosby about the plight of the I.B.C. and our current financial dilemma. I reassured the three mentioned Brothers that, the loan was to be paid back in full no later than the agreed upon date. Earlier in August, during Brother Crusty's tour of Virginia with me, we talked to the Southern Trustees about possibly borrowing money to finance the year-book, and the general consensus was affirmative with the stipulation that it be repaid. Today, as in the past few weeks, I feel very much like a failure and performed insufficiently in my office. The Trustee loan was not paid back in full or part by January 1, 1986, and remains outstanding for the following reasons.

In order to secure this loan, aside from giving the Trustees my word and honour that it would be repaid, I used the remaining Garnet & Silvers as a means of material collateral. I had also placed a tremendous amount of faith in the inevitable financial success of our then, upcoming Christmas function in the South.

Most unfortunately and even more unexpectedly, the Christmas dance did not materialize as originally anticipated. First, I must state that, the dance was successful in certain areas, all of which I can not accept credit. Although the crowd was all too noticeably smaller than in 1984, alot of alumni attended whom had not been at fraternity functions or conventions in many years. I truly believe that the dance could not have been better planned and through absolutely no fault of the organizers could or should it be deemed a disaster.

Brother Kenny Martin (Trustee) and Brother Barry Poe (past-I.B.C. Southern Vice-President) were co-chairmen of the dance committee and were served admirably by the likes of none other than, Carla Poe and Brother Mayes Marks (Beta Alpha alumnus). In excess of two-hundred letters of invitation were mailed across Virginia and Canada to alumni Brothers presently listed on our contact sheets. Original responses were not indicative of the dance's attendance figures. From my reports, far too many Brothers gave their word that they would attend and did not show, belittling the efforts of the committee. Additionally, it should be noted that Brother Martin took a great risk in signing for a liquor permit, and Brothers Marks and Poe put their name and reputation on the line with the City Manager of Hopewell, Va. Carla's contributions to the entire affair was again overwhelming, as she essentially brought the whole thing together as she's done in the past. I can not say how much effort these four put into the dance, but it certainly was a hell of a lot more than they received in return.

Also, Brothers Tim Poe, Johnnie H. Smith, Skeeter Reelitz, Jamie Phelps, Scott Jones, Earl Belcher and few others are thanked for their help in the massive clean-up session. Incidentally, there has been much controversy over the expenses incurred by the dance, most of it centered around a band costing \$1100.00 (U.S.). Personally, I dearly hope we can have a similar function at the end of 1986, but we should consider operating on a much smaller scale. I think an annual alumni reunion or dance is greatly needed in the south (and north), but all of you will surely agree that finances may be our most important concern at present. One final low note is that, less than ten copies of the Garnet & Silver were sold during the dance, a far cry from the over one hundred copies that should have been sold. At present, these unsold and apparently unmarketable copies, are in my possession and are starving for a new home.

The remaining one-hundred plus copies will cut our deficit to the Trustees by about fifty-percent. Please, consider parting with a few meager dollars from your wallet and purchase a copy of the G & S. I can't tell you how much time, effort and sweat was put into its conception, but it was a heck of a lot more than it will take for y'all to send in a couple of dollars. Selling price per copy remains at \$7.50 (U.S.) or \$10.00 (CDN), and by purchasing a copy, you'll more than make me happy, you'll also buy Gamma Delta Psi a little more life.

In closing, I've been quite critical in this message, but only because I wish to be constructive in the manner that will motivate all of Gamma Delta Psi to stand up and realize that we are hurting. The one true bright spot of which we may lay claim to at present is believe it or not, expansion.

However, it is nearly impossible for our organization to expand without the necessary funds. Every year, chapters maintain the right to know exactly what their dues are being used for, well, in 1985-86, all \$300.00 (CDN) of chapter dues money (via Beta Pi, Beta Xi, and Gamma Eta) was spent to settle our debt for the Christmas dance. The net loss figure for our reunion has amounted to \$440.00 (U.S.), exclusive of other miscellaneous expenses such as stamps, envelopes, and invitations.

Now, until the past twelve months or so, expansion has been absolutely nothing more than a dreamy discussion at conventions. Not so anymore, just ask the likes of Brothers Ed Decker, Bill Schmitt, Brian Hollister, Dave Dekker, Bill 'The Crusty Thrill' Michelin, Larry Belcher, and Johnnie H. Smith about expansion, and they'll be sure to reply.


Brothers Ed Decker (I.B.C. Secretary) and Bill Schmitt (I.B.C. Treasurer) have been instrumental in the formation of a new I.B.C. Expansion Flyer, in addition to aiding Brother Brian Hollister's (Beta Pi) efforts in establishing a sound and secure crescent club in Milan, Michigan. Brother Crusty (I.B.C. Historian) as y'all know, has become something of a cult figure at the University of Windsor where he is responsible for starting Delta Chapter of Gamma Psi Fraternity International. Again, Brother Dave Dekker (Gamma Eta Alumnus) has begun the foundation of Epsilon Chapter of Gamma Psi at the University of Western Ontario, with support of Brother Larry Belcher (Beta & Gamma Chapter) and Brother Danny Wyatt (Beta Pi & Beta Chapter).

While I was in the South for my recent four-weekend tour of Virginia, I met with Brother Johnnie H. Smith (Beta Psi Alumnus) amongst others, including Brother Wyatt, and we discussed in length, the possibilities of re-establishing a chapter at Prince George H.S. in Prince George County, Va. Johnnie mentioned that he has a young cousin whom is very much interested in fraternity, and Brother Smith and I paid his cousin, Steven Smith, a brief visit. My initial impressions about Steven were very positive, and I discovered that he is well-mannered, mature, and quite authentically interested in Gamma Delta Psi. I am presently, in the process of forwarding Brother Smith an expansion package which will enable Steven to establish a crescent club immediately with the support of about a-half dozen school mates. Anyone interested in supporting our efforts in this area within the Tri-city/Prince George, Va. vicinity, please contact Johnnie as soon as possible.

I do not know what more to say, so I believe that this would be an opportune time to sign off. I ask for the collective consideration, patience, and faith of all my Brothers in this trying and difficult time for Gamma Delta Psi. Life has been less than pleasureable for me in the past few weeks, and I feel dejected, inadequate, and selfish over what has transpired, but I am nevertheless very determined to succeed. I openly encourage and welcome all correspondence to my office in response to what I've said on the previous pages. And, I also ask the Trustees to please continue to believe in me and my abilities.

I shall return ..... smile.

## TREASURER'S REPORT

Dear Brothers:

Ed Decker has asked me to pass on a message to all chapters, last year's I.B.C. Brothers and anyone else who has a report from Convention '85. In order to get the ball rolling for this year's convention, we must have all reports and minutes from last year's convention. If these reports are submitted to him soon, he can get copies of the minutes out to all chapters before the end of the school year. All the easier for the delegates to prepare for their job at convention! Please, cooperate.

At this point in time, according to my reports more than half of all chapters have money outstanding for non-payment of past dues. These chapters will receive a letter from myself in the near future informing them of their debts, they will lose their vote at upcoming rallies and convention.
